Student Changemakers

The leadership studies curriculum explores how leaders have navigated change throughout history. Students apply concepts learned in class to lead change on campus and beyond.

Dan Mahoney, '20, led campus-wide efforts to promote mental health awareness, sexual misconduct awareness, and recycling. The recipient of the Mace Award for the University's outstanding student, he hopes to lead positive social change by working in the political arena.





Her Jepson independent study, "The Afghan Diaspora in Pakistan," took Mehreen Usman, '20, to Lahore, Pakistan, where she interned with the Human Rights Commission of Pakistan. She later presented her research at the Jepson Research Symposium. Mehreen was awarded a prestigious Fulbright grant to complete an English Teaching Assistantship in Malaysia in 2021.



Afghan native Lina Tori Jan, '20, championed the rights of immigrants, refugees, minorities, and women through her campus activism, community service, and Jepson internship with an international women's rights nonprofit. She received the School's Servant Leader Award and, thanks to the Jepson Scholars Program, a full scholarship to pursue a public policy master's degree at the University of Oxford this fall.

Eliana Fleischer, '20, the recipient of the **James** MacGregor Burns Award, the School's highest honor, sees law school in her future. She studied British law at the University of Cambridge through the **Jepson at** Cambridge summer program and explored American immigration law through her Jepson internship. Eliana received the School's Fredric M. Jablin Award for Undergraduate Research to undertake her senior honors thesis on how the criminal justice system fails to hold police accountable in the deaths of unarmed Black men.

Scholarly Innovators

Since the School's inception in 1992 as the nation's first undergraduate school of leadership studies, our interdisciplinary faculty have been at the forefront of innovative teaching and scholarship. Their research and teaching on leadership draw upon their expertise in the disciplines of anthropology, economics, history, literature, philosophy, political science, psychology, and religion.



THE UNIVERSITY RECOGNIZED FOUR JEPSON FACULTY MEMBERS AT THE BEGINNING OF THE ACADEMIC YEAR:

Associate professor Jessica Flanigan, appointed the Richard L. Morrill Chair in Ethics and Democratic Values, is collaborating with leadership studies student Alec Greven, '21, on a free speech initiative for college campuses.

Associate professor Javier Hidalgo received the University's Distinguished Educator Award in recognition of his creative teaching techniques on argument mapping and historical role playing.

Professor and Associate Dean of Academic Affairs Crystal Hoyt was appointed the Colonel Leo K. and Gaylee Thorsness Endowed Chair in Ethical Leadership. Her ground-breaking research on growth mindsets explores how people's beliefs in their ability to modify their behavior can help them achieve desired results.

David Wilkins, who joined the faculty in August as the most recent E. Claiborne Robins Distinguished Professor in Leadership Studies, is a leading scholar of Native politics and governance.



Rana Dajani, a molecular biologist from Jordan and the School's 2019–21 Zuzana Simoniova Cmelikova Visiting Scholar, brings a global perspective to campus. She has received international recognition for her research on the genetics of trauma, her advocacy for women in science, and her promotion of global childhood literacy through the nonprofit she founded. We Love Reading.

Associate professor Julian Hayter, an expert on African-American history and politics, has been the go-to scholar for reporters covering the removal of Confederate statues and the Black Lives Matter protests in Richmond. He has shared his insights in interviews with CNN, CBS, NBC, NPR, National Geographic, The Economist, USA Today, the Associated Press, and the Richmond Times-Dispatch among others. In April, he appeared in episode six of "The Innocence Files," a Netflix docuseries on wrongful conviction.

the front lines of the war against the virus.

The program manager of the Primary Care Innovation Lab in the Department of Family Medicine at the University of Washington, **Victoria Lyon**, '13, and her team developed and deployed a rapid-test system for COVID-19 for the Seattle area, the first U.S. epicenter of the pandemic.



"How do we give patients a good death during a global pandemic?" asked **Lindsay Flanagan**, '14. The pediatric oncology nurse practitioner took some time away from her job at the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia to work with adult COVID patients in a N.J. hospital intensive care unit.



"Medical students have tried to help during this pandemic, from creating face shields and acquiring PPE donations for hospital staff, to organizing a program to help facilitate remote communication between folks caring for coronavirus patients and their families," said **John Sobieski**, '14. He is a rising fourth-year medical student at Cooper Medical School of Rowan University in Camden, N.J.



"The leadership I brought to bear was to remain calm," said **Patrick Oliver**, '98, about his experience working as an emergency room physician in the initial phase of the pandemic, when hospitals were facing heightened anxiety and uncertainty.

Change Influencers

The campus community and the broader public flocked to the School's signature speaker events to gain new insights into how the world is changing and adapting on multiple fronts. Topics included the delivery and consumption of news, interaction with the internet and social media, and democratic politics and governance.



Four speakers addressed the topic **"Digital Dystopias: Truth** and Representation in the Internet Age" as part of the annual Jepson Leadership Forum. One speaker, Derek Thompson, staff writer at The Atlantic, told a captivated Forum audience, "Consumer spying is a natural part of life in the digital world."



Describing the Electoral College as "the devil you know," University of Notre Dame political scientist **Joshua Kaplan** kicked off the annual **Marshall Center Lecture Series** with a discussion of the pros and cons of Electoral College reform. He was one of four speakers who discussed leadership and democracy as part of this year's lecture series.



During classroom visits and a public presentation, the School's 2019–20 **leaders-in-residence**, Richmond Times-Dispatch columnist **Michael Paul Williams** and NPR White House correspondent **Ayesha Rascoe**, stressed the critical role of a free press in a democratic society.

Members of the Class of 2020, comprising 75 majors and 15 minors, logged just over 29,000 hours fulfilling their course service-learning requirements and Jepson internships. In addition, 54 studied abroad, 13 were Science Leadership Scholars, and two received a full scholarship through the Jepson Scholars Program to pursue a one-year master's degree at the University of Oxford.
